Jennie's Story

At eight months pregnant, Jennie had nowhere to go. After she and her boy-friend ended their relationship, she tried moving in with her ailing grandmother, but the situation couldn't work long-term. Fortunately for Jennie and her baby, she found Jubilee Village. "I'm so grateful I was able to move into the transitional housing program. Everyone has been so loving and encouraging, and it truly has been like a family."

Three weeks after moving in, Jennie gave birth to her son. House parents and counselors surrounded Jennie with support, teaching her to parent a newborn, in addition to case management, counseling and life skills classes.

The community at Jubilee Village helped Jennie feel loved and supported. "It was important to me to know that, even though my son and I live in our own apartment at Jubilee Village, when I struggle—whether it be financially, emotionally or with parenting—there is always a loving house parent who is happily available just down the hall."

At Jubilee Village, case management includes financial literacy lessons, with sessions on budgeting with the goal to live independently. Throughout her two years at Jubilee Village, Jennie managed to pay off most of her debt, build a savings account and find a full-time office job. When Jennie's time at Jubilee Village ended, she was accepted into the Graduate Living program, which helps transition successful graduates of Jubilee's two-year program. Graduate Living participants move to an upper floor at Jubilee Village and are required to pay increased rent while still receiving case management and the benefits of living in community. The program currently serves two girls, with hopes of three in 2015.

Older Adults Christmas Lunch

Outreach Community Center in Carol Stream's annual Older Adults Christmas Luncheon was held at First Presbyterian Church of Wheaton on Friday, Dec. 19.

This is the premiere holiday event of the year for our seniors and for many, it's their only holiday celebration. This year, 44 volunteers, representing five area churches, volunteered their service, food and finances to make the luncheon possible. 146 older adults enjoyed the traditional holiday meal, plus raffles and games.

"This Christmas luncheon has become a holiday tradition for us—very much so," said Marie. "My ankle's real bad and I'm getting a little behind in everything, so I almost thought I shouldn't come—but then I decided, no, I'm going because I love it."

Rosalie shared how much the program means to her: "I've been coming for twelve years. And they do help you out with a lot of things you'd like to know that you don't know. I still use all the gifts I've received over the years—the pillow and blanket from past years keep me warm.""

The Franklin Middle School Chamber Orchestra provided entertainment. Each senior received a Jewel gift certificate and personal gift of a tea pot, packages of tea and coffee, plus dish clothes hand knitted by a team of volunteers.



Christmas Stores serve 1,481 children in Carol Stream and West Chicago

Outreach Community Center in Carol Stream

The 20th annual Christmas Store at Outreach Community Center in Carol Stream took place on Saturday, December 13. The event serves underresourced families from the community by allowing parents to shop for gifts for their children and grandchildren at deeply discounted prices.

OCC Director Donald Robinson calls this year's event a huge success. "I believe many experienced Jesus's gift of love through service and kindness of volunteers and the compassion and care of our partners," he says.

"Our 20th anniversary was a great success," added LaTanya Gatewood, Outreach's Director of Volunteer Services. "I continually heard comments such as, 'I am so happy to be here' and 'Thank you for the work you all do.""

The store served 388 families, including 1,001 children! It was made possible by 363 volunteers who together contributed 1,452 hours. Store sales were \$12,136, more than \$2,100 greater than last year! All proceeds go to OCC's Emergency Assistance Fund, serving local families in crisis throughout the year.

Puente del Pueblo

Puente del Pueblo held its fifth annual Christmas Store on Saturday, December 13. Modeled after the Christmas Store at OCC, The store makes a difference in the lives of shoppers and volunteers alike.

Director of Puente del Pueblo Matthew McNiel shares Gabi's story. "Gabi arrived at her appointment with five children to shop for and only \$30," he says. "She was anxious and worried that her money could not possibly stretch enough." As she shopped, she carefully calculated each price in her head. When she had chosen something for everyone, she was amazed that her total was \$27.50—just what she had with a little change left over. "She teared up and expressed how shocked and relieved she was to be able to buy gifts for all five of her kids."

Alejandro, Gabi's shopper's helper, volunteered with his family for the second year in a row. His experience with Gabi moved him. "It changed my perspective on the Christmas Store," he says. "I see how much value it provides for the community. And to serve alongside my teenage daughter—this is the best value I can give to her." Alejandro is encouraging church members to save money year-round so quality gifts can be purchased and donated to the store.

Alejandro was one of 156 individuals who volunteered for the event, and the store served 182 families and 480 children. All proceeds will underwrite the Adult Literacy programming at Puente del Pueblo.

Sales continue to remain strong at Jubilee Furniture and interior improvements to the existing store are almost complete. 4,000 square feet has been added to the store and warehouse by enclosing an open air space under the existing roof. The block walls are up, windows and doors are installed, HVAC is up and run-



ning, and electrical is underway. The Men's Group from First Presbyterian Glen Ellyn generously donated the interior finish work, including insulation, drywall, trim, paint and labor, which equates to a gift of \$20,000 in labor and \$5,000 for materials. We are so grateful to this faithful team of men.

Beth Howley, store interior designer and display consultant, is also a member at First Presbyterian in Glen Ellyn and is donating the interior design plan.
